Saint Louis 2019 Science Fair Jerome Lenczowski

At the 2019 K-12 Saint Louis Science Fair held May 8 at Queeny Park, ASPRS members Dr. David Alspaugh, and Bobbi and Jerry Lenczowski served as judges for the ASPRS Heartland Region's Special Act Awards. Over 1500 projects were on display, and three projects were selected as relevant to ASPRS core disciplines.

A second grade student created a detailed report that showed he understood the importance of 'where' by including images and maps in a "MO Water Survey."

An eighth grade Crossroads College Preparatory Academy student learned that his hypothesis, that photo quality was a function of the size of the box for his pinhole cameras, was incorrect in his project, "Which type of Pinhole Camera Works Best" He is now prepared to work with more accurate measurements for focal lengths and object distance from the lens,

A twelfth grade Kirkwood High School student in an Honors project presented a detailed earth science and geospatial information analysis that incorporated 3D topography in "Intersection of Sustainable Conservation and Outdoor Learning Environments."

The ASPRS Region provided each winner with a monetary award, certificates and letters of congratulation, and a Heartland Region coin.

The D-Day Pilot and the Flight Nurse

One of Our Own: Jack Graham By Pat Reed and David Alspaugh




Many of us have known John (Jack) Graham for many years. He had a long, productive and interesting career at DMA. He was in the first team that deployed the PPDB (Point Positioning Data Base) system in Viet Nam. What many people don't know is his early history. Jack and his younger

sister were born in southern China to missionary parents. They were living in a boarding school in northern China the day the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, the day after Jack's tenth birthday. They became prisoners and were interned in Japanese prison camps for the duration of World War II.

During the last half of the war the camp where Jack and his sister were confined was combined with a larger prison camp where Eric Liddell, a Scottish missionary, was interned. Eric Liddell was the subject of the 1981 movie, "Chariots of Fire." The movie immortalized him as the Scottish athlete who in the 1924 Paris Olympics refused to run the 100 meter sprint because it was to be held on Sunday.

Instead, he was entered in the 400 meter race the following Thursday, a race for which he had only limited practice. But he won, setting a new world record in the process.



His world record is not the chief thing for which Eric Liddell is best remembered: It is the strength of his religious convictions. His refusal to run on Sunday was adamant, in spite of the efforts of the future King of England, Edward VIII, to persuade him otherwise.

Jack has fond memories of Eric and the impact he had on younger members of the camp. To keep the many

young people occupied in their spare time, Eric organized evening activities, games and entertainment.

One of Jack's jobs was serving on KP (Kitchen Patrol) duty in one of the mess halls, and occasionally he worked on Eric Liddell's shift. Times were hard and food was short, but Eric displayed such contagious cheerfulness that being in a Japanese concentration camp and on KP duty was much more bearable.



Just before the war ended Eric suffered a massive brain hemorrhage and died the same day. All the detainees mourned his passing. A fellow prisoner and missionary later wrote, "The entire camp, especially its youth, was stunned for days, so great was the vacuum that Eric's death had left."

He was laid to rest in the

cemetery in the Japanese portion of the camp. Jack said he would always remember Eric as a totally unselfish person who did his best to make life better for his friends.
